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

<u>Introduction</u>

- This module explores the prominent challenges victims and survivors experience as they move towards becoming integrated into a mainstream lifestyle. It identifies the rights of victims, how we partner with service providers to provide assistance to victims throughout the first point of contact.
- This component of the course provides information about specific resources that are available to trafficking victims in the locale in which the course is being delivered. The training will also discuss additional difficulties that face trafficking victims who are nonnationals.
